

Hello Cash Valley Families! We are so excited to hear children's voices in the building and seeing them in person. I must compliment your children on returning to school ready to learn. They are following safety protocol, being respectful of others, and persevering in their learning. It is amazing how resilient children can be through change of instruction and routine. Please let your child know that you are so proud of their flexibility and positive attitude. As the first marking period ends, Cash Valley keeps rocking and rolling! Our discipline approach through Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) has earned a GOLD LEVEL recognition award by maintaining a multi-tiered system team structure providing practices that guide positive actions and choices. We also celebrate the announcement of our school earning the NATIONAL Blue Ribbon Schools Award for high academic achievement – WOW! Along with submitting an intense application, below is the overview "school story" submitted to the United State Education Department:

Cash Valley provides education through general classrooms, regional structured learning environments, inclusion services, and early childhood programs. Believing "Every Connection Counts," we are an educational family acknowledging that positive school-community relationships develop an integrated unit with common expectations for educational success. We attribute this success to our vision, mission, and core values; with school initiatives prioritized on students' needs delivered through best practices. The instructional framework follows the Gradual Release of Responsibility and Universal Design for Learning principles, a process including focused and guided instruction with collaborative and independent learning. Students are provided with multiple means of representation, action, expression, and engagement. Mindfulness and metacognition strategies allow students to "drive their brains" and apply the growth mindset approach. Maryland Coalition of Inclusive Educators and Schoolwide Integrated Framework for Transformation focus on equitybased inclusive practices and collaborative planning among general and special educators. Formative Assessment for Maryland Educators and Leadership Teams provide teaching tools to differentiate the process, product, and learning environment. Sustaining effective instructional strategies through Professional Learning Communities improve practices with book studies, coaching, observations, reflection, and strategic planning. Differentiation is our strategy for academic success. We conduct formal data dives of assessments using the Five Whys technique to identify root causes of problematic areas and create action plans for improvement strategies. Multi-Tiered Systems of Support identify instructional practices to sustain our improvement initiatives. Differentiation approaches have unified our school and created an environment with quality feedback, blended learning, and strong relationships to foster a love of lifelong learning.

Arrival and dismissal must remain an organized routine for functionality and safety. Students can arrive at 8:20 when the doors become unlocked. There is not any supervision available prior to this time. If you are using the car drop off area, please be considerate of other drivers in the line, have your children prepare to exit quickly, and continue moving the line forward. Please do not allow your children to exit the vehicle until the car is directly beside the school walkway. This is a safety concern due to the vehicles continuously moving forward. If you want to see your child enter the building, park at the upper lot and walk your student to the front of the building. Dismissal begins at 1:25. Vehicles are not to enter the lower lot until the buses have left the parking lot (approximately 1:45). This is another situation that can become dangerous for those using the walkways throughout the parking lot. Cameras and school resource officers will be monitoring the arrival and dismissal procedures to maintain safety and security.

For all school information, a communicator folder is sent home, along with daily contact through assignment books and Schoology. Please visit the school website at acpsmd.org/ca regarding and Facebook facebook.com/cashvalleypto. Please monitor all information, hard copy and electronic, that is sent home. As the principal, I continue the development of a school family where visitors, students, and staff are excited to attend, learn, and grow. Families and school personnel together want to achieve the same overall goal – a safe, secure environment where students have the support and resources to grow. Regardless of how the delivery of instruction may change, strong relationships between school and home will be the support necessary for all students to be successful. Everyone is welcomed into the Cash Valley family and again it is awesome to have students in the building!

5th Grade News-*Mrs. Rowley & Mr. O'Neal*

Welcome to the wonderful world of 5th grade! Even though 5th was all virtual with the exception of one week, we have covered a lot of instructional territory! We finally have our routines down and we have been working hard! We have learned many new and exciting concepts since the beginning of the year! In Language Arts, we have worked on our inferencing, main idea and details, analyzing text structure, and character and setting skills, and we will continue to review these skills to keep them sharp! Students have been working hard on strengthening their writing skills, virtual or not, you cannot stop the 5th grade fire with Friday writing! Ask your child about what they are reading and writing about in school. In math we have already covered place value operations, reading and writing decimals to the thousandths, comparing and rounding whole numbers and decimals to the thousandths, base 10 units, exponents, operations in decimal form, and we are currently working on standard algorithm for multiplication, calculating the volume of rectangular prisms, and we are looking forward to working on 2 digit division! Whew, we have been busy!

In science we have completed our Life Science unit about the food chain and the flow of energy, ecosystems, and invasive species, and we are currently wrapping up our Physics Unit. We will be moving onto Earth and Space science next!!

So far in Social Studies we have studied how the First Americans came to America, natural resources, and renewable and non-renewable resources. 5th grade has also just completed their Native American unit focusing on their customs and the knowledge of the natural resources within each region.

It is important for our students to practice their new skills and solidify the topics we have already covered, especially since we are back to an all virtual schedule!

Parent/Tips-

Occasionally, children become frustrated and have meltdowns. Teach your children some calming strategies. It may take a while, but don't give up. It will get better. Some strategies are rocking, walking, swinging, playing calm and quiet music, dimming lights, and reducing the noise in the room.

Items can also be helpful to practice deep breathing. Teach your children to blow bubbles gently and slowly. They can also use a pinwheel to practice breathing out slowing or quickly to figure which

way works and feels best. A third strategy is to have children lay on their backs with a stuffed animal on their bellies. Breathe in deeply to move the animal up and breathe out to bring the animal back down.

Children are engaging with beginning writing through our daily morning messages. We are building comprehension and attention span with our literacy read alouds. Children have explored attributes and position words during our math and science lessons. We look forward to working with our youngest explorers as we venture through these unprecedented times.

PreK-4 News—*Mrs. Hardman*

Pre-K is ready to GOBBLE up some new learning! During the month of November, we will be learning about Thanksgiving. We will compare Thanksgiving in the past and in the present. In Reading, we just finished the reading unit on "Family and Friends". The class read a variety of stories on how to be a good friend and ways we can help each other. We also looked at how families can be different and what families do together. We have also started to identify the letters of the alphabet by name and the sounds each letter makes. In math class, the boys and girls are learn-

ing to touch and count groups of up to five objects arranged in different ways. They are learning to match their counting to a numeral.



We are also learning how to represent numbers by drawings or objects. The students are learning to see patterns in the counting sequence. When counting forward, they see each number is 1 more: One. One more is 2. Two. One more is 3. Our next math focus is identifying, describing and building shapes. Pre-K would like to thank all of our wonderful families for their support and understanding during this new adventure with virtual learning. I hope to see all of my students back in the classroom very soon.


Go the Cash Valley School Bookmarks page at https://www.acpsmd.org/domain/496

Click on the link for our school Library Media Center catalog

When the student's catalog page comes up, go to the upper right corner and click on Log In

When the next screen appears, just click on the box that says "Log in with Google"

You will now see the complete Library catalog. Scroll down on the screen until you see the section called "e-books"



Click on "See All" to see the collection of ebooks

To have your student check one out, click on the book and then on 'details' and you will see the button "check out".

The book can now be opened and read on their device.

There is a virtual bookmark that they can use to mark their places and then they simply come back to their book through the library link to finish it. Some of the books will read aloud to them.

When they are done, they click on the button that says "Check In" and the book will be back in the collection.

If you have any questions about this new feature with our library, please contact Mrs. Robertson at school and she will be glad to help you. The students in Grades 3-5 have already been instructed in the use of our new library catalog and how to access the ebooks.
