Robotics @ WES

Third grade students at Westernport received six hours of foundational robotics lessons to introduce them to the definition of a robot, a machine that is programmed to perform a task. They also learned the difference between hardware, the pieces that the students can touch and what the robot is made from, and software, which are the directions which control the hardware. The students worked with partners to build and program the robots. Then the students were given mini challenges to solve, which gave them a chance to try coding and provided them with an introduction to computer science. Sensors were introduced in hour five. The final hour involved a challenge that required a modification of the hardware and a modification of the computer program. Ms. Jessica Mellon, from the University of Maryland Extension Services, presented the lessons, assisted by classroom teachers, Ms. Carr and Ms. Moran. Students really loved building the robots and were very sorry to take their robots apart!

In Case of Emergency...

Westernport Elementary School has been and will continue to conduct a variety of emergency drills throughout the year to practice different critical situations with students. Types of drills that will be performed are the following:

Evacuation/Fire Drill: Students exit the building in the event of an emergency situation, such as fire or smoke.

Reverse Evacuation Drill: During an outside activity, students re-enter the building due to an unsafe situation that is occurring in the neighborhood or surrounding communities.

Drop, Cover, and Hold Drill: Due to extreme weather events students drop to the floor, take cover under desks or tables, and hold on. The school participated in the Great South East Shakeout Drill on October 17^{th} to practice in the event of an earthquake.

Lock-In Drill: All exterior doors are locked and regular instructional routines are followed inside the building. This is the normal procedure during daily instructional time except no one can enter or leave the building during this drill.

Lockdown Drill: With every situation presenting different scenarios, students and staff must make safety choices. The option determined by the ACPS is to instruct students in the "Run, Hide, Fight" method. Each school will show a video describing these procedures to students in grades 1-5. Pre-kindergarten and kindergarten teachers will use age-appropriate methods to communicate the same information. This approach teaches the following if an intruder enters the building:

RUN means run and exit the building to a safe location. HIDE means hide in a safe location that has been determined by the teacher.

FIGHT means fight to provide time to escape to a safe place, for example, throwing a book.

Through a county initiative, the school has developed a Critical Incident Plan listing procedures to assist with emergency situations. If you have any questions regarding the county required drills listed above, please call the school at 301-359-0511. Be assured that the faculty and staff are committed to taking care of your children as if they were our own.

Be Safe Online

K-5 students at Westernport Elementary learn about internet safety each year as part of the library media curriculum. The curriculum (adopted in 2016 and updated in 2020) is a group of lessons from Common Sense Education. Primary students will spend approximately six classes working on internet safety topics. Intermediate students will spend about 10 classes working on internet safety. Lessons will continue through grade twelve. Some guidance lessons also focus on internet safety topics.

Once again, here are some internet safety tips that are helpful for parents and children alike.

Pick a strong password. Don't use common words or significant dates in your life. Create a password of 8-12 characters that's a mix of letters—both upper and lowercase—and numbers/punctuation marks so it can't be guessed easily. 16 characters are even safer!

Avoid Common Passwords

Your password is a defensive precaution against hackers and identity theft. Don't make it easy for someone else to invade your privacy online. A study of more than 32 million exposed passwords (by Internet security firm Imperva) revealed the 10 most common, which are 123456-12345-123456789 Password-Iloveyou-Princess-Rockyou 1234567-12345678-Abc123

Don't give your birth date. Using your full birth date—month, day, and year—can give hackers and identity thieves an avenue to more confidential information. Share just the day and month, or no birthday at all.

Use privacy controls. Limit what's available on your online profile so strangers don't have complete access to everything you post online.

Vacations. Don't announce online that you're going to be away. An empty home is an easy target for burglars.

Nutrition ABCs

University of Maryland Extension Educator Tammy Humberson, who visits our school on a regular basis to provide students with nutrition lessons, will be featured in our newsletter from time to time with nutrition tips for families.

Miss Tammy says, "The "Edible ABC" program encourages children to try new foods. This month's spotlight is on the "Cauliflower". A cauliflower is a cruciferous vegetable that is considered a "superfood" for its fiber content, high levels of vitamins B and C and antioxidants. Make eating cauliflower fun by helping your children prepare it by themselves. Show them how to break a head of cauliflower into small florets. Put the florets in a ziplock bag. Add one tablespoon olive oil and one half cup grated parmesan cheese. Close the bag and shake vigorously. Spread on a cookie sheet. Bake at 425 for 20 minutes. Enjoy!


