### At Last! We're Coming Back to WES!

As we begin the 3rd marking period and plan for students to enter back into school buildings, the following plans will be implemented. Please read all of the information carefully.

#### <u>Grades 2 - 5</u>

Beginning Tuesday, February 2nd, all students in grades 2 through 5 will participate with their regular classroom teacher at their school for virtual instruction.

The return to schools timeline was approved by the elected Board of Education during the January 25 BOE meeting. Grade 2-5 students will participate in the previously implemented Hybrid/Concurrent A/B A/B V schedule for in-person learning beginning Monday, March 8. (Please note that the word concurrent means simultaneously/at the same time.)

Students who are currently in a virtual classroom and whose families have chosen for them to opt out of any in-person learning will still participate with their classroom teacher remotely each day.

Students who will be returning to the Hybrid/Concurrent A/B schedule for in-person instruction will also participate with their classroom teacher remotely on the days when they do not attend school in-person.

Fridays will continue to be a virtual learning day for all students.

#### PreK, Kindergarten, Grade 1

Students who were new to opting out in the second marking period and whose families have chosen for them to continue not participating in any form of in-person instruction for the third marking period will be placed with a virtual teacher soon after February 1st, when student / class size changes have been evaluated.

Students will begin attending in-person classroom instruction on Monday through Thursday, as was previously implemented, on Monday, March 1, 2021.

Students currently placed with a virtual teacher and whose families have chosen for them to continue to not participate in any in-person instruction will remain with the virtual classroom teacher.

Fridays will continue to be a virtual learning day for all students.


















### Thank you, Reeves Private Foundation!

Westernport Elementary School was recently awarded a \$2,000 grant from the J. Norman and Margaret J. Reeves Private Foundation, which is administrated by First United Trust & Investments.

The mission of the Reeves Private Foundation is to benefit non-profit organizations in the vicinity of Westernport, Maryland; Keyser, West Virginia; Luke, Maryland and Piedmont, West Virginia. A committee of local représentatives from those areas evaluates each grant request based on its merits and how the grant meets the desires of the foundation.

This is the seventh year that the Reeves Foundation has awarded a grant to the school. Mrs. Deborah Hendrickson, media specialist, applied for the grant in August and the check arrived at the school in early November.

About 20% of this year's Reeves Grant was used to purchase 36 eBooks to add to the Follett Destiny Discover "side" of the new Follett Online Library System, which is available to all students at WES. Students may access these eBooks by going to the Westernport Home Page (https://www.acpsmd.org/wt), then choosing Bookmarks, Students should click on the Follett Destiny Library Catalog (look for the "tree" on the top left corner) and log in through google using their usual ACPS credentials. Students may read the eBooks online or check out one at a time.

Approximately 80% of the grant money will be used to allow students choose a "free" book from a virtual book fair, if possible, or to purchase more eBooks to add to Follett Destiny Discover.

We are extremely grateful to the Reeves Private Foundation, for this support for the One Student/One Book program that we have had in the past and for the possibility of continuing it in spring 2021 (or for the possibility of more eBooks for students to enjoy...) Follett Destiny




