A group of students from the Biomedical Science Honors program at Mountain Ridge High School recently visited Westernport Elementary School, accompanied by their teacher, Mrs. Becky Byzon. The students in this program take a "deep dive into all of the different aspects, careers, and tests of the biomedical field." They participate in Project Lead the Way (PLTW) units, which help them to build knowledge and skills in areas including computer sci-

ence, engineering and biomedical science. They also learn problem-solving, develop critical and creative thinking skills, as well as gain knowledge in the areas of communication, collaboration and creative thinking.

The third grade students of Mr. Ben Benson and Ms. Chelsea Carr participated in hands-on activities with the visiting students and really enjoyed it. WES students

were able to learn about bones and skulls, practice reading an eye chart and see the reaction from a simple test on a knee, among other skills. The third grade teachers and other staff members enjoyed seeing WES alumni Chloe Cole, Gabby Guevara-Zelaya, Chloe Haggerty, Layla Miller, Lindsey Stafford, Morgan Steckman and McKenna Zais interact with their students. Other high school students working with the third grade classes were Samantha Blubaugh, Madison Bowman, Ava Fiorita, Lindsey Kahl and Brycen Ritchie. All of these high school students plan to enter career paths to study psychiatry, dental hygiene, pediatrics or forensic science, marine biology, veterinary medicine, pre-medical studies, nursing, and other medical fields. #### Westernport Elementary PBIS



What is PBIS? PBIS is a process for creating a safer, positive, and more effective school environment. It focuses on improving a school's ability to teach and support positive behavior for all students. PBIS allows our school to design, implement, and evaluate effective school-wide rules and procedures.

What are the school rules? We PAWS to be Respectful, Responsible, Safe, and Kind! This is the expectation for our students and staff. These rules can be applied to and used to teach discipline at school as well as home. Parents can use these four rules with their children to help correct homework habits, attendance issues, bad attitudes, and other family conflicts. The students are reminded throughout the school day of these rules. The PBIS language helps create a consistent flow of positive behavior.

PBIS School Wide Events... Westernport will be hosting PBIS school wide events. Students may earn their admission to these events by meeting the guidelines for each event. Parent letters will be sent home before each event. These incentives may include a fall event, spirit week, winter movie, dance, Winter Olympics, and a Spring Fling, which is the biggest event at the year's end.

#### Thank you, Reeves Private Foundation!

Westernport Elementary School was recently awarded a \$1,750.00 grant from the J. Norman and Margaret J. Reeves Private Foundation, which is administrated by First United Trust & Investments.

The mission of the Reeves Private Foundation is to benefit non-profit organizations in the vicinity of Westernport, Maryland; Keyser, West Virginia; Luke, Maryland and Piedmont, West Virginia. A committee of local representatives from those areas evaluates each grant request based on its merits and how the grant meets the desires of the foundation.

This is the ninth year that the Reeves Foundation has awarded a grant to the school. Mrs. Deborah Hendrickson, library media specialist, applied for the grant in August and the check arrived at the school in the fall.

#### 100th Day Celebration (and Trivia!)



On Tuesday, January 30, 2024, students and staff at WES celebrated the 100th day of school. Students dressed up as if they were students 100 years ago OR if they were 100 years old. There were a lot of creative costumes!

Here is some 100th Day Trivia:

- The cornerstone of the school was laid on **November 9**, **1922**. The building was named Bruce High School, in memory of Oliver Bruce, an educator in the community for 45 years. The first graduation was held in the school gym on **June 25**, **1923**, although the school was not yet finished.
- On September 4, 1924, 156 students and 10 faculty members moved into the building.
- In 1938 and 1939, an addition was made to the left of the original building using a grant from the Public Works Administration (PWA). The cafeteria kitchen area was added at the same time.
- Students in grades 7-12 moved into "Bruce on the Hill" in spring of 1957. Hammond Street Elementary students moved to the building in April 1958 and the building became Westernport Elementary.
- Look for a piece of green tape on the floor of the second floor hallway which marks the line where the addition to Westernport Elementary ends (McDonald's side) and the original building begins.
- Teachers and students using rooms located in the original part of the building include Miss Orange and Mrs. C. Smith (Kindergarten) on the first floor, as well as Mrs. Clark and Mr. McGregor. Ms. Bolton and Mrs. Chapman (grade 2), Mr. Jones (grade 5) and Mrs. Staci Wilson and students are using 100 year old rooms on the third floor. Ms. Carr and students (grade 3) and the Faculty Room, Main Office (front part), Guidance Room and Gym/Stage area are 100-year old rooms on the second floor.



#### Student Access Resource

with STAR CARDS students can access exclusive library resources plus check out up to three books or audiobooks with no late fees.

#### What is a STAR CARD?

The STAR CARD is your access key to the world of information and learning. It is a special library account, which you can use to borrow books, e-books, magazines, journals, online encyclopedia, and other resources. Language learning tools & homework help available.

#### Request a STAR CARD number.

When you check out at the circulation desk, tell the staff you want to use your STAR CARD. They will ask for your name and birth date to confirm your identity. Write your number here.

Example, a student with the ID of A01234 has a STAR CARD number of 22210S00A01234. All the "0"s on the card are numbers, unless students last names starts with an "0".
