Trip to Antarctica: WES Alumni, Dr. Robby May Visits Grade 2



Dr. Robby May visited WES on March 27th to tell second grade students about his January 2023 trip to Antarctica. Dr. May won a Grosvenor Teaching Fellowship which allowed him to go for free instead of paying \$30,000 (or more) to make this trip. It took him three days by airplane and two days by ship, plus the use of a motorized Zodiac boat to travel to this continent from his home in Maryland, This National Geographic Expedition took participants to both the eastern dry side of the side of Antarctica which has a more pebble-like surface and less snow and ice as well as to the western wet and cold side of the continent. Dr. May told students that January is "summer" in Antarctica so the temperature during the day was 33-36 degrees Fahrenheit, but he still had to dress in four layers to prevent from getting hypothermia. He brought his parka to show to students and told them that it is too warm to wear here in Western Maryland!


Students were especially interested in penguins and asked many questions. Dr. May showed students pictures of the different kinds of penguins he encountered, but told them that people had to stay 10 feet away so as not to give the penguins any germs. He also said that they were "stinky" and demonstrated how penguins behave in water.

Students in second grade recently completed a mini-unit in the library media classes of Mrs. Deborah Hendrickson in which they learned about Antarctica and penguins. Our fourth grade students (when in second grade) completed the same mini-unit and received an email and pictures from Dr. May, but current second students were glad that he was able visit in person!



We are proud to say that Dr. May is a native of Westernport and a WES alumni. He was a teacher for 13 years, with experience in private schools in NC, locally at Fort Hill High School and in the EMS world. He earned his doctorate in education in 2022. Dr. May is currently the Director of Clinical Services for Monongalia County Emergency Medical Services.

Looking Back...March 13, 2020





• The World Health Organization (WHO) declared COVID-19 to be a pandemic on **Wednesday**, **March 11**, **2020**. All schools in Maryland, including Westernport Elementary, closed on **Friday**, **March 13**, **2020** by order of Governor Larry Hogan. This closure was to be for two weeks but lasted until the end of the 2019-2020 school year. Students then received assignments from platforms such as Google Classroom and Class Dojo.

• Although students began to return in person in August 2020, school was again closed in November. Students were then taught virtually using a platform called Schoology until about March 1, 2021, then taught concurrently (with some students in classrooms and some online at the same time) until the end of the school year. (Some students returned to WES for face-to-face instruction, but not all. Some students also spent or finished the year in virtual classrooms with a mixture of classmates from across Allegany County.)

• Students and teachers returned in fall 2021 with masks, which were worn until March 1, 2022, when wearing masks became optional.

• The 2022-2023 school year began on **August 26**, **2022**. Westernport Elementary School students and staff began to enjoy their first "normal" school year since the pandemic began.

Encourage your child to do their best.

Testing can be intimidating to some, think about encouraging words you can express to your child. Discuss test taking strategies, such as:

- reading the question several times to make sense of the problem
- highlighting important information
- bookmarking a question if stuck
- taking a deep breath and resetting if feeling overwhelmed

Get a good night sleep.

Research shows that getting a good night sleep boosts memory and learning and increases attention span.

Non-stressful morning routine

Keep your child's morning routine as normal as possible. Set an alarm a few minutes early to provide a relaxed and calm morning atmosphere.

Avoid appointments and arrive on time



When scheduling appointments, please consider avoiding the morning of the identified testing dates. Research shows that if a child is assessed in their typical learning environment, the likelihood of success increases.
