

## Fire Prevention=Every Week

No one wants to hear the sound of sirens as fire trucks scream through the streets. But fires are a reality. Fire Prevention Week is October 5-11, 2025 and The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) always uses this as an opportunity to educate students and parents about fire safety. This year's theme is "Charge into Fire Safety: Lithium-Ion Batteries in Your Home!" The NFPA website reminds us to buy only listed products. When buying a product that uses a lithium-ion battery look for a safety certification mark such as UL, ETL, or CSA. This means it meets important safety standards. Charge devices safely. Always use the cords that came with the product to charge. Follow the instructions from the manufacturer. Buy new chargers from the manufacturer or one that the manufacturer has approved. Charge your device on a hard surface. Don't overcharge your device. Unplug it or remove the battery when it's fully charged. Recycle batteries responsibly. Don't throw lithium-ion batteries in the trash or regular recycling bins because they could start a fire. Recycle your device or battery at a safe battery recycling location. Visit <u>call2recycle.org</u> to find a recycling spot near you. Once a fire starts in your home, you may have as little as two minutes to escape. Advance planning and a practiced fire escape route can save lives. NFPA suggests the following when making an escape plan for your family:

- Look for places that a fire may start
- Listen for the sound of the smoke alarm
- Learn two ways out of each room

NFPA, which has sponsored Fire Prevention Week since 1922, also stresses general fire prevention and lists a series of checks to be made in the home to lessen the chances for a fire. ## \*Schoolwide Title I-What's That?\*



Westernport Elementary School is one of nine schools in Allegany County which have been identified to receive Title I funds and to operate a schoolwide Title I program.

#### <u>Criteria</u>

- At least 40% of the student population is eligible for Free and Reduced Meals (FARMS)
- Title I funds are used to upgrade the educational program so that the education for ALL children is improved
- All children are eligible for Title I services

#### Program Components

 Comprehensive needs assessment of the entire school which focuses on the achievement of students on the state academic content and achievement standards

- Schoolwide reform strategies that are evidence based and are designed to address the needs of all students and especially the low achieving students
- Strategies to increase parent/family/stakeholder engagement
- Plans to assist preschool children in their transition from early childhood programs to elementary school
- Coordination and integration of federal, state, and local services and programs including violence prevention, nutrition, housing, Head Start, adult education, vocational and technical education, and job training

Each Title I school develops a schoolwide plan which includes all of the school wide Title I components and which may be reviewed on each school's website. Title I plans are available in each school office for parent/community review and comment. Annually, principals review the Title I schoolwide program with parents.

### EVACUATE! (A location may be specified)

## Author Hilary Horder Hippely, Visits WES

Author Hilary Horder Hippely visited Westernport Elementary School on Friday, October 3, 2025 to talk to students about her book, <u>I Know How to Draw an Owl</u>. This presentation was brought to WES due to a two-year partnership between Westernport Elementary and the Frostburg State University Children's Literature Centre.

Ms. Hippely was a teacher for over 30 years. She told students that she got the idea for her book when she walking along the beach. There she found one of her students living in a car with her mother. She was touched by the bravery of that family and of other families she met during her teaching career who held onto hope amid many hardships. It took Ms. Hippely two years to write the book and one year for the illustrator. Mr. Matt James, to complete the pictures. The words in the book travelled from Seattle to New York to Canada and finally to China where the book was printed, then back to bookstores and libraries here.





Ms. Hippely was in Frostburg this week to receive the 13th annual CLC Children's Book Award from Frostburg State University Children's Literature Centre. This award is given to the author of a children's picture book which most embodies the attributes of compassion, love, or courage. The aim of the CLC is to encourage and support an author/illustrator in the early years of their career, and one who has published in the United States within the past three years. The author, in conjunction with FSU, purchased 220 copies of the books for students and staff (thanks so much!) and a copy of the book complete with the award label was also donated to the school library. Ms. Hippely placed a bookplate in each book and wrote each child's name in the book. As requested by the author, Mrs. Hendrickson, media specialist, read the book to each class prior to the author visit in collaboration with Mr. John Seibert, art teacher. Westernport students recently participated in Maryland Agriculture in the Classroom during the week of September 22-26, 2025. Students were given a series of 25-minute mini-lessons by teacher, Ms. Dena O'Neill, who spent the week at WÉS. The Mobile Science Lab Experience with the theme, Aquatics Products, was supplied by the Maryland Agricultural Educa-



tion Foundation and their yellow trailer was parked on the front lawn of the school. Activities for students in grades K-5 included scientific investigations such as "Who Lives in the Wetlands"; "Wetland Charm"; "Oysters and the Chesapeake Bay"; "Salt Water Layers"; "But Outs"; and "Crabs and the Chesapeake Bay." In one activity, Ms. O'Neill had several students dress up as bugs and talked to their classmates about the eyes and mouths found on different types of bugs. Students used their noses to identify different scents just as a bug would. Finally, students made their own bug! The Ag Products Mobile Lab Experience is supported by grant funds provided through the Allegany County Public Schools.
