Braddock Math Counts

On Saturday, February 24th,

20 mathletes from the Braddock Middle School's Math Counts team competed in the Hagerstown Regional Chapter Competition. For the 6th straight year and 20th overall, Braddock finished in first place. The team of 4 along with 6 additional individuals qualified for the state finals to be held at John's Hopkins University on March 17th. Coached by Ray Short and Sheila Greise, this will mark the 26th time in 32 years that a team from Braddock has advance to the elite state finals. The team members are; Drake Rose, Sofiia Kucher, Cole Fiscus, and Colin Sheehe. Also advancing are Ian Kiddy, Erica Metheny, Daniel Gregory, Quinn Cohen, Brianna Palasik, and Eli Litman. Eighty students from 8 middle schools in Allegany and Washington County competed in three rounds. Among all competitors, Colin Sheehe took top honors, followed by Drake Rose in second, Ian Kiddy in third, Cole Fiscus in fifth, and Sofiia Kucher in sixth. In the live count down round, Drake Rose finished second. The coaches would like to thank Principal Danny Carter for his support and all the parents who have provided us with such great kids.

The 23rd Winter Olympics

The 23rd Winter Olympics were just held in PyeongChang, South Korea. The Olympics were held from February 9th to February 25th. The opening ceremony was centered around a message of peace, and there were performances, songs, and the lighting of the Olympic cauldron. The opening ceremony is a big part of what the Olympics stand for: international peace. But the Olympics have come a long way from the original in Greece. At first, the Olympics were created as a religious festival and sporting event in 776 BCE. During the games, war was stopped in order to guarantee safe passage. Now, the Olympics have nothing to do with religion.

This year, there were 102 events total, and 93 countries participated. The U.S. won 23 medals in the Olympics, 9 of those gold. The U.S. was fourth in overall medal count, after Norway, Germany, and Canada. For the U.S., there were gold medals in snow-boarding, alpine skiing, cross country skiing, freestyle skiing, hockey, and curling. There were also silver and bronze medals won in luge, speed skating, figure skating, and bob-sleigh. 4 of the 9 gold medals were won in snowboarding, and 2 of those were won by 17 year olds! The next winter Olympics, in 2022, will be held in Beijing, China.
