Blueprint Update

- Goals
 - To transform Maryland's early childhood, primary, and secondary education system to the levels of high performing systems around the world
 - Establish a career ladder system for educators composed of levels through which teachers may progress and gain certain authority, status, and compensation as they gain certain expertise
- Overall ACPS Blueprint Vision:
 - "ACPS will provide a world-class education to all students that prepares them to acquire the knowledge and skills necessary to graduate, ready for postsecondary learning, prepared for a successful career, global competitiveness, and meaningful participation in society and life."

Superintendent's Report (cont.)

Blueprint Update

- Brief timeline:
 - Blueprint began in 2021
 - First Blueprint Plan submitted March 15, 2023
 - From March 15, 2023 until now, have had teams engaging in technical and instructional sessions to prepare for the next plan
 - In October 2023, began working with a Strategic Facilitator
 - Submission of Phase 2 Part 1 Blueprint Implementation will be submitted March 15, 2024
 - Submission of Phase 2 Part 2 Blueprint Implementation will need submitted by May 1, 2024
 - The new plan will be due in 2027

Instructional

Academic Calendar and Virtual Plan Update

- Requesting approval for the 2024-2025 Academic School calendar and inclement weather virtual plan
 - Provides 180 days of instruction for students and 190 days for teachers, as well as built-in days
 - Draft was created with collaboration from the instructional supervisors, shared with principals, staff, and ACEA
 - o Calendar being proposed at this time:
 - Start date of Wednesday, August 14th The start date is optimally designed to ensure the teachers have plenty of time to cover the content and standards for ELA, math, science, and social studies before the spring MCAP assessments, which take place in early March through May
 - The academic calendar is very similar to this year's calendar with a similar break for Thanksqiving and Christmas and a short break for Easter
 - There are some necessary days for teacher and parent conferences as well as teacher work time and professional learning
 - The proposed calendar has the opening of schools for students on Wednesday, August the 21st
 - One major change is due to the requirement of Senate Bill 610, requiring the local school board to provide virtual education days for severe weather events and the school system incorporate built-in days within the calendar for school closures. ACPS has built in three days at the end of the school year for inclement weather closures. If additional inclement weather days beyond those three built-in days, then ACPS may use virtual education. A virtual education day must consist of four hours of synchronous instruction with additional asynchronous instruction

Instructional (cont.)

Academic Calendar and Virtual Plan Update

- Vote to amend the calendar
 - o Change the start date for teachers from August 14th to August 19th
 - Start date for students would go from August 21st to August 26th
 - Three days would then be tacked on to the end of the calendar making the last day for students June 5th and the last day for teachers June 6th without needing any makeup days. If the three built-in makeup days are needed the last day for students would be June 10th and June 11th for teachers
 - In addition, I would like the motion to include to adjust two of the scheduled three-hour delayed openings for students to full days. Those would include December 3rd, when we return from Thanksgiving break and April 22nd, when we return from Easter break
